This celebration of the sacrament was witnessed by the TRM church family who welcomed our families of origin and friends, a mix of other denominations and non-believers. Everybody said how moved they had been and especially by the testimonies.

Amongst those being baptised was a lady who was there because Jehovah's Witnesses had challenged her to read the Bible, which she did for the first time. Five others had completed the Alpha Course and had found it a life changing experience.

They had been aware of the presence of God but until then had never known a personal relationship with God. Each had faced challenges in life because of bereavement, or illness of family members or themselves, or isolation. They had experienced healing, comfort, peace and joy and God's love. All felt that baptism is an important way to publicly express new life in God and the first step in our journey to get closer to God.

As the final hymn, "The Greatest Day In History", rang out the congregation responded by singing, playing instruments, clapping their hands, waving banners and dancing in the aisle. It was like Psalms 149:3, "Let them praise his name in the dance: let them sing praises unto him with the timbrel and the harp."

This was followed in true TRM tradition with refreshments and a Pat Kirk special cake.

From our own correspondent in Tanzania

I can hear the mosque tonight. There is power. There are times when I don't hear the call to prayer of course: when the Vodacom lorry goes past blasting (very nice quality) local pop music advertising their wares with a colourful dance troop moving in unison to the music, (if not to Health and Safety regulations) or when a LOUD wedding finishes at three in the morning, or when United or Arsenal are on Satellite Sport at the little 'cinema' over in the small fishing village of Kibirizi and the commentary echoes across the bay. Tonight as I write this, it is a mixture of a wedding and further away, a film, I think. I retaliate with 'Jumpin' Jack Flash' and 'Lola' - well-known missionary songs of auld! When in Rome...

There are many churches and many mosques in Kigoma. Depending on where you stand you can be immersed in an Islamic community or a Christian one. They tend to be quite different flavours. Christians look at you in a fairly friendly way, as a rule; Moslems frequently, rather less so. Younger children, bless them, always know better. Occasionally they shout something rude, but you know they've only got it from the mosques. Of themselves their look of disapproval soon turns into a smile and a wave if you do likewise.



We took the monsters for a day at the beach on Tuesday. They loved it. Big waves that concerned me a bit, knocked them down (they don't swim, yet) so that they reappeared out of the foam squealing, to wait for the next one to do it to them, again. Beryl (who has come here to join me in 'HELPER' as the head of the primary school we hope to build) was doing what I was doing:

counting heads. We compared regularly, confused to have gained another at one point, until we realised it wasn't one of ours, but a stray from a family nearby. Then home-made doughnuts and juice and off home again with two asleep in the car.

The Voda lorry comes back again. I watch the lithe dancers in their bright red team kit. It's really loud. I wave and do a Mr Bean at the disco impersonation. They stop for a moment to laugh, pointing me out to each other,

then without any obvious signal, step back into their dance.

And I say unto you, that many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven.

HELPER

This year TRM, particularly the Youth church, will be supporting a new charity HELPER, set up by Andy Blake in Kigoma, Tanzania. HELPER stands for **H**opeful, **E**ducated, **L**oved, **P**repared, **E**mpowered, **R**eleased.

For primary school children, education is free but to get in, all children must have a uniform. When I read Andy's newsletter about all the things he was working to achieve in Kigoma, school uniforms jumped out at me and I know we can, as a church, take this on as a project.

A uniform for a primary school child costs about £20. From the beginning of September Youth church will be "encouraging" you to buy a school uniform kit consisting of a cardboard doll and a sheet of blank uniforms. These will be shirt, shorts and shoes for boys; shirts, pinafore dresses and shoes for girls. Cut them out, customise them, put your name on the back of the doll, attach the uniform and return them to the church. We will then display them all over the church. Who knows, by October we might have a school full of cardboard children in different uniforms.

The fun does not stop there! For the Harvest service on 4 October, dig out an item of uniform that you may have worn some time over the years, e.g. school tie, regimental cap, scout neck tie and woggle – if you wish to wear your school uniform that will be quite alright.

Let's all get into the spirit of the thing and help Andy's charity to be a super HELPER for the Lord.

Seb Allwright talks about a fund-raising meal

As many of you know I love Uganda. I also love the young people at Thursday's youth club, so what better than combine the two on a Thursday evening, with plenty of food and lovely friends from church?

During my times in Uganda I have got to know and had the privilege of being involved in a children's centre in a small, poor, rural village. This Children's centre is called Adonai (meaning 'my Lord' in Latin in case you're interested!). It consists of a home for 20 children, a school with hundreds of children and a sponsorship scheme for many of them. It's run by Ugandans for Ugandans with some help from some of my friends in the UK. So on a Thursday evening in June, many adults paid to enjoy an evening of food served by the young people and entertainment provided by some very talented youngsters. I also shared some of my experiences in Uganda and what Adonai is. (If you want to know more please ask).

All of the proceeds and donations have gone straight to my friends in Uganda and were gratefully received. This money, which totalled about £300 will go towards some much needed items such as beds for all the children, mattresses and blankets. A great evening was had by all and I'm sure we will look at doing another event similar before I go in December. It reminded me of the call we have upon our lives to care for the orphans and widows in distress. This evening was one way that the young people and the church together were able to do this and make a difference in the lives of these precious Ugandan children.

Serving God Through Technology

I'm still smiling at a joke told in a sermon by our former minister Chris Kirk. He delivered it in Florida only a few days ago, but I listened to it on the web site of Palm Harbor United Methodist Church (just 'google' *Chris Kirk sermon*). I could have chosen to download it to my iPhone and listened to it literally anywhere. Technology can be a wonderful tool for spreading God's word.

At Totley Rise we don't yet 'podcast' sermons, but our website does carry all the editions of *Alive!* and details of our organisations and activities. We also use technology in a variety of other ways – without the sound system run by John Lashmar and his team many would struggle to hear the services, and Judith Slack's production of large print hymn sheets is only one of many ways the photocopier spreads the word.

It's in the programming of the laptop projection system where I feel I make my main contribution to worship at TRM. The system enables us to use a much wider range of songs than the books do, and by using pictures, patterns or textures I try to help set an appropriate mood. (Since I believe the Lord has a sense of humour, one or two are tongue in cheek – look carefully at the background next time we sing 'This Is My Desire' or 'Lo He Comes in Clouds Descending').

Other people are involved too of course, particularly Tim, who runs the system nearly every Sunday morning, and Gail. The programming can be very time consuming but it has its rewards, most notably that it often gives me the privilege of having the church to myself and I can spend some moments in quiet contemplation. And sometimes not so quiet – some of those hymns are irresistible and I just have to sing them while I work and hear them reverberate off the walls. It's probably best that only the Lord is there to hear them!

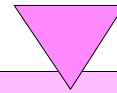
Which of us can believe that the spritely **Len Capper** is celebrating his 80th birthday at the end of August - many happy returns Len!
