## Easter at TRM

This year Palm Sunday coincided with the clocks going forward, which could explain why Spirit the donkey looked a little more docile than normal. Spirit might have still been half asleep, but that did not detract from the spectacle of the church family walking down Baslow Road waving palm leaves (well, bamboo leaves at least). In the service which followed the Youth Church treated us to a sketch about the life of Jesus, which was told through the lives of three trees, each playing their own part in His life, despite other ideas they might have had about what they wanted to become. Garry took us on a journey through the emotions of Holy Week and explained how the highs and lows reflect our human experience. As with Holy Week, God is with us through all the highs and lows, standing firm with us as He did with Jesus.

Good Friday 2010 did not produce the sun drenched morning that we have been treated to in the past, but the dark skies made a fitting backdrop as the cross was carried from Totley to the church. In a meaningful service which began in the church car park, the congregation moved to six wooden crosses positioned at

different locations within the church. At each cross a different part of the story, leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus, was told. The service was extremely moving, reminding us of the sacrifice Jesus made for us all.

The surprise on the faces of those entering the church on Easter Sunday morning provided, in some small way, an insight into the expression that Mary must have had on



discovering the empty tomb on that first Easter morning. The reason for the looks of astonishment was that they too were greeted by a life size tomb, complete with rolled away stone, at the front of the church. The traditional Easter Garden had indeed been super-sized! The theme of the service was 'Breakout'. This manifested itself in many ways from the rolling of Easter eggs down steps (to test their impact resistance) to the release of a giant box of balloons. During the service Paul, Dean, Ken, Rachel, Pat and Rebecca were welcomed into membership of the church, providing a fitting testimony to the power of our risen Lord.

Nobody could have any doubts about why the congregation had gathered on that Sunday morning as the service finished with voices, heads and hearts lifted high.

He is risen indeed!



Weeks of lovely sunshine led us to visions of tea and cake on the lawn following a genteel duck race on the stream. Then a reality check! By the start of the race, the rain was falling steadily.

To the screams of "Come on Bob" and "My purple duck's got stuck", our intrepid explorers, the ducks not Julie and Alan who were in the water with them, started on their perilous journey downstream. (We never realised how slippy the rocks were or how many deep pockets of water there were until Alan got a welly-full of water).

Finally we rounded the bend to where Dean and Rod with lots of enthusiastic supporters caught the ducks in nets. This was followed by a welcome cup of coffee and lots of duck biscuits and cake in the schoolroom. Number 62 was the first duck home and Phyl Holmes as owner was presented with a "gold" cup and a box of chocs on Sunday morning in church. Would we do it again? YES.

# I Know the Plans I Have for You

It was Robert Burns who first penned the oft quoted words 'The best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men':

*"But Mousie, thou are no thy-lane,  
In proving foresight may be vain:  
The best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men,  
Gang aft agley,  
An' lea'e us nought but grief an' pain,  
For promis'd joy!"*

Burns reassures the mouse that he is not alone in proving foresight may be vain, that even the best laid schemes of mice and men go awry and leave us nothing but grief and pain, when the promised joy of those plans does not come to fruition.

One commentator says that this poem was written at a low point in the poet's life. I'm sure that we all, at one time or another, have low points in our lives, times when our hopes, aspirations and plans do not come to pass and we think of 'best laid plans...'

When that happens we live with regret. At other times, it is only as we look back that we realise that it was good that our best laid plans didn't come to fruition, because in the long term, they were not 'best' for us.

Jeremiah (an Old Testament Prophet) was reassured of God's purpose and plan for his own life. In the first chapter, he is reminded that his life is no accident, "*Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart; I appointed you as a prophet to the nations.*" We can all take comfort from these words and

the understanding that as God has formed us, He knows us and He sets us apart.

Later on God calls Jeremiah to encourage the people of God in exile, away from their homeland and well out of their comfort zone. God reassured them that He had a preferred future for them. "*For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."*

As we make and carry out our own plans, sometimes they may incidentally run parallel to God's plans, sometimes they may run against them. However that may be for us, I am comforted and reassured that God loves us enough that He has each of us in mind. He knows the plans He has for us and those plans are only ever for our benefit and never to our detriment. The purpose of God's plans is that we have a hope and a future and we prosper in Him.

God's motivation for His plans is His love for us and He will not, He cannot, stop loving us; and when you love like that, you only ever want the best for those you love.

Unlike Robbie Burns's 'best laid schemes o' mice an' men', God's plans for our lives never go awry and never leave us grief and pain. Why not trust in Him and see for yourself?

## The Crèche

As you sit in church on Sunday mornings you may hear a bit of background noise – a bump, a squeak or an occasional cry. The crèche is on the go!

The home of the crèche is behind the semi-sound-proof screen at the back of the church extension. This area has all mod cons – colourful toys, puzzles, rich tea biscuits, playdough, etc., and even its own little heater and sun blinds to ensure that the children (and helpers) are kept at the right temperature. The wonderful facility of having the service relayed through speakers means that adults have the option of leaving their children or remaining in the crèche room but still being part of the church family.

There is a regular core of crèche helpers with an extra volunteer carer each week. At present there are only two regular under-3's, but numbers are often swelled by visiting families and christening parties.

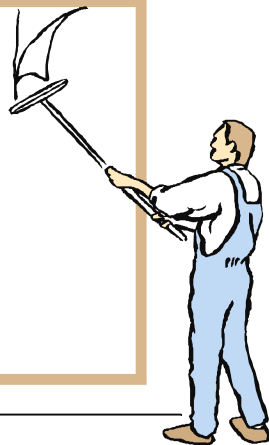
After the service the crèche is used by older children as a safe place to play away from hot drinks, while their parents enjoy a coffee and chat. The sliding doors on the crèche room mean that it is a flexible space for other things such as small meetings or personal prayer or can be opened to add to the extension when extra seating is required.

The crèche is manned by loving (police checked) carers from 10.15 a.m. throughout the Sunday morning service and warmly welcomes children and their families. More information from Josie 2369546.

# Confessions of a Bill Poster



As part of our series 'Serving God in ...' we asked Alex Wilson to write about his work on preparing the posters that are shown outside the church.

Since 1980 I have been decorating our church hall at Christmas time and for special events and celebrations. I am not a talented artist like our own Leonardo Cappa and Rutherford Lamborghini – though my garden fence has been admired! However I can display work reasonably well and 'create' with paper.

I gained 'world' exposure a few years later when I was asked to produce posters for our wayside pulpit. It was a great challenge: there was a large area to cover and preparation was very time consuming. Originally the posters were glued to the board, a precarious task on a wild, cold day. Stripping off afterwards was very unpleasant – I'm referring to removing the poster!

After a few sticky years I was doubly blessed. I discovered a local retired sign writer who is also a superb

printer, and who was prepared to reproduce our posters from my ideas. Colin Duffield who is now well turned eighty is a tremendous help.

There are several aims for our wayside pulpit. The information or message should be clearly and attractively presented in a language that is comprehensible to non-church attenders. Humour can be a useful medium as can a statement that makes you stop and think – similar to humorous statements such as *Two parrots sat on a perch, One said to the other "Can you smell fish?"* \*

Our aim is to interest and challenge people and to attract them to our services and events so that they may learn more about Jesus and the Christian faith. They will then experience the warmth of a special church family which is welcoming, caring and supportive and where many are prepared to give their time, talents and love. The posters encourage people to attend and it is the responsibility of all in the church to be especially concerned and welcoming to visitors.

Bill posting can be a dangerous job. Unity is an attitude often referred to in the bible, but when I have used the word UNITED I have been accused of bias. There have been demands for an equal use of the word WEDNESDAY, but there are no references to that word in the bible. What would *Wednesday we stand!* mean?

Preparing our wayside pulpit is a great privilege. I think at times it is effective. Thank you all for your encouragement and please let me know as soon as possible when I make spelling mistakes or display the wrong date or time. It's my age you know!

## Wash Out



The morning of 8 May saw the car park awash with soapy water as the church held a combined toy swap, coffee morning and car wash in support of Iris Ministries (see adjoining article). The event raised over £275 and was organised by Pauline and Peter Dibben, who wish to thank all those who helped and those who attended the event. Having visited an orphanage in Mozambique, they know that the money will make a real difference.

## Iris Ministries

Iris Ministries is a charity run by Heidi and Roland Baker. It came about because Heidi felt God telling her to feed the children in Mozambique. They have now set up over 1,000 churches in Mozambique, and a number of orphanages. They offer home, love and healing to hurting children, many of whom have lost parents and family due to HIV/ AIDs.

Pauline and Peter Dibben visited the Zimpeto orphanage near the capital city of Mozambique, Maputo, when they travelled to Mozambique last September. They attended a church service on a Sunday. During the church service, hundreds of children were dancing and singing and praying and praising God. After the service, Peter and Pauline shared lunch with people from the orphanage and around 150 people who live on a rubbish dump. They were then invited to play with children from the orphanage and were amazed that they had so little yet were so loving and happy. The visit inspired them to support the work of Iris Ministries, including organising the recent car wash, coffee morning toy swap.

On 25 March Nadine Parkinson came to speak. She based her talk on Isaiah 43, verses 4 and 5, “*Since you are precious and honoured in my sight, and because I love you, I will give men in exchange for you, and people in exchange for your life. Do not be afraid, for I am with you.*”

Nadine was saying that, if our security is in God, then when things go wrong we are more secure and sustained than if we rely on people. She gave examples from her own life.

The vision for *Lunch Break* is to give young Mums time and space over lunch to hear a topic of interest, whilst their children are being cared for in a crèche. There was a good number of people present, some of whom were more young at heart than young in years. All seemed to enjoy the company, the food and the talk.
